



Olive is desperate to get close to Theo—really, really close. She's always struggled to connect with people. And now she's in her thirties, single, and so flustered by relationships that she secretly records her conversations, hoping to decipher social clues and find a way to be less alone.





Then Theo turns up for a shift at the same food pantry where she volunteers. He's a surgeon fascinated by human organs, a former soccer player, and possibly as weird as Olive. For the first time, someone seems to crave and understand her. Every recording Olive makes of Theo is a balm—which just makes her more afraid of losing him. The only solution seems to be to bind him to her forever. Luckily, the gap between Theo's front teeth is just wide enough for something—or someone—to slip inside. In this arresting and immersive new novel, Gross explores the boundaries of love and the body with a deft hand, as universal human impulses bleed into the surreal.

Anne Epstein and Howard Curzer will be retiring and moving to Brooklyn NY at the end of August 2025. We will very much miss their company, conviviality, spirited conversation, lively participation, community leadership, and vegetarian dishes. We hope they will keep us updated on what's doing in Brooklyn - and wish them the absolute best!

They write: We met at the University of Texas, where Howard finished his PhD in Philosophy and Anne received her BA. We came to Lubbock in 1985 feeling daunted at the prospect of living in West Texas after Austin and Houston. Howard came to work at Texas Tech as an Assistant Professor in the Philosophy Department and Anne finished her MD degree and residency in Internal Medicine in Houston, then moved to Lubbock to work as a faculty member in the

Department of Medicine at the TTU Health Sciences Center. We joined Shaareth Israel when our daughter Mirah was in kindergarten so she could attend religious school, and we were swept up in the challenges of raising a Jewish child in Lubbock and in the Lubbock school system. Mirah had to choose whether to conceal her Judaism or acknowledge it at the age of 4. She decided to declare that she was Jewish and proud to be different! We immersed ourselves in Jewish life and learning in order to support her, and to raise her knowledgeably within the Jewish tradition. Anne taught religious school briefly, from which experience she developed a profound respect for the teaching profession, then taught weekly adult Torah class for 2 years. Anne served as a board member, and then as President of the congregation. She led services almost weekly for 2 years when Shaareth Israel was between Rabbis. Eventually others joined the rotation, but she



continued to lead services at least monthly for a total of 6 years, offering her original commentary on Torah as well as leading the prayers. Anne taught herself to read and translate Torah, and rotated Torah readings with Leon Shturman and Etta Mayer so that the congregation could enjoy Torah readings every week.

Anne was a founding member of the Lubbock Interfaith Association and served as the Temple's representative She gave talks to many civic, educational, and religious groups about Judaism, and even taught classes on Torah at Second Baptist.

Howard wrote articles every month for the Temple newsletter for 6 1/2 years that were notable for his unique philosopher's take on Torah, generating a lot of interest and occasional controversy. He went on to write Torah commentary for the Huffington Post. Some of his Newsletter and Post articles were later published in scholarly journals.

Mirah became a proud Jewish kid with a very strong Jewish identity, had her Bat Mitzvah at Shaareth Israel, and continued to be very active in Jewish life and the social justice causes which are part of our Reform tradition. Mission accomplished! While she was in high school, she and 3 other students representing the Lubbock High Gay-Straight Alliance sued the Lubbock Independent School district over LGBTQ issues in what came to be a highly publicized case, bringing national attention to Lubbock High, and inspiring her to become an attorney. She has remained active in Jewish life and lives with her husband Rabbi Josh Stanton and their daughter Clara in Brooklyn NY.



After 10 years in academic medicine, Anne set up her own solo private practice in Internal Medicine, and eventually became Board Certified in Sleep Medicine in addition to Internal Medicine. She is proud to be a Fellow of the American College of Physicians. Anne found great joy and fulfillment in helping people with complex medical problems such as chronic fatigue and fibromyalgia. She developed an interest in the health consequences of fracking, published several articles on fracking, and gave talks to civic groups in Texas and other states. She also served as a member, and later as the chair of the City of Lubbock Board of Health, and was appointed to the Lubbock Oil and Gas advisory committee by City Council.

Howard continued to flourish in his philosophy career at Texas Tech, becoming a full professor and later a President's Excellence Research Professor. He has enjoyed teaching a wide range of courses and enjoyed research in several sub-fields of philosophy. He has published 3 books and has just submitted his fourth. He has published almost 100 articles and book reviews.

After 40 years in Lubbock, where we raised a child, developed our careers, and became part of the Jewish community and the larger Lubbock community, it is difficult to retire and to leave Lubbock.

However, we are excited about moving to Brooklyn just a few doors away from our daughter, son-in-law, and 6 year old grandchild, and excited about the new life ahead. It will be quite a transition. We think it will be fun, but we will miss our wonderful Jewish community here in Lubbock!

Reprinted from June 2025 Letter from the Chair of the Texas Holocaust, Genocide, and Antisemitism Advisory Commission

In these days of rising antisemitic incidents across America, it is once again time to take stock of our roles as Americans and Texans. At the Texas Holocaust, Genocide, and Antisemitism Advisory Commission (THGAAC), we take seriously our commitment to educate and inspire teachers, students, and all citizens across our great (big) state. We bring the lessons of the Holocaust and other genocides to light to combat antisemitism and all forms of hate.

The THGAAC is working to dismantle antisemitism on multiple fronts. While we are not an Israel commission, it is impossible to take the events from October 7, 2023, through the imminent Israeli conquest of the ambitious nuclear crazed Iranian regime and not feel that we are making progress at home. Good over evil, right over horribly wrong are the virtues that give us hope.

Our 1525 Club unites dedicated student leaders between the ages of 15 and 25 as we work to address antisemitism in schools and on college campuses. Last month, the 1525 Club kicked off with a live-streamed panel featuring Professor Alan Dershowitz and Israeli advocate (and Ft. Worth's own) Lizzy Savetsky, sharing resources to support students as they navigate today's campus climate. Thank you to Commissioner Adam Blum, who is instrumental in leading the effort.

Additionally, we followed the passage of our primary legislative recommendation in our 2024 Study on Antisemitism in Texas. This bill, now law, applies the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance (IHRA) definition of antisemitism to the K-16 public school education code. It is a tool to identify when a student's code of conduct is motivated by antisemitism. As the main author of the bill and THGAAC Vice Chair Sandra Hagee Parker says, "If you can't define it, you can't defeat it."

After all, in these days of rising antisemitism, it is the role of the THGAAC to lead the best way forward for a safer, stronger, and more educated Texas.
