

From the Cantor

Recently, when I got to Lubbock, I was asked

"what is a Cantor actually, and what is the story behind the role?" It's a great question, since everyone who is Jewish or not Jewish knows the title of Rabbi, but many don't know quite what a Cantor is.

The history of the role of Cantor goes back at least a thousand years, when the Jewish prayer service and the siddur were starting to shape into the form that we know today. This, of course, became the mode of how Jews connected to God after the destruction of both the First and Second Temples, with the beginnings of prayer beginning to take form during the Babylonian Captivity.

What really prodded a more formalized form of Jewish prayer came after the destruction of the Second Temple in 70 CE, and the end of the offerings that were brought to the priests in Jerusalem for sacrifice. In a desire to keep the three times a day practices, prayers were fixed to a morning, afternoon, and evening schedule. The main part of our prayers, the Amidah and the Sh'ma, became the centerpiece of daily practice, but many of the other prayers were actually not written down and were even improvised.

Over the next several centuries living in the diaspora, a more fixed structure of the prayers began to evolve, and the texts of these prayers also became fixed.

Eventually, it became clear that someone was needed to oversee the structure and the order of the prayers, and a new role, the Hazzan, or Overseer of Prayers, came into existence. Soon, the role of prayer organizer became one of being the prayer LEADER, emphasizing the need to have someone who had a good fluency in Hebrew and the prayers. Over time, the men who were more sought after than others also needed to have a pleasant voice. So, by the time the first official prayerbooks were coming out, close to the end of the first millennium, a new role, The Hazzan, was born.

Since that time, the role of the Hazzan has always been as the leader of prayers. It is a bit more complex than one might think, as it not only requires an intimate knowledge of Hebrew and possessing a pleasing singing voice, but over the centuries, the melodies for the same prayers also change depending on the holiday, and even what service one is doing. As you might note, I did not say the word, Cantor. That is a word borrowed from the romance languages and connotes one who sings. However, this does not come close to describing the full extent of the role of the traditional Hazzan. And later on, during the golden age of the Cantorate, from the 17th-20th centuries, some of the highest levels of artistry were achieved by Hazzanim (plural for Hazzan), and were sought after by large and affluent communities. In more recent times, the role of preparing students for Bar and Bat Mitzvah ceremonies has fallen onto the Cantor, and is a major part of the work of a modern Cantor in synagogue settings.

One very interesting thing to note is the element of democracy and the shared role of sanctity that exists in the Jewish community. There are many sacred roles that can be fulfilled by anyone who shows the knowledge, dedication, and skill to accomplish them.

This included the ritual slaughterer (shochet), the mohel (the circumciser), the Mashgiach (the person who makes sure kitchens and food prep are kosher), the Ba'al T'kiyah (shofar blower), and many more. Rabbis certainly were central figures in a thriving Jewish community, but the Hazzan, or Cantor, was another important leader in the Jewish community, and to this day is able to perform many of the same ritual roles that a Rabbi can do, such as perform weddings, lead funerals, as well as lead all services, in effect, any of the needs Congregation Shaareth Israel has!

Please feel free to ask me anything else about this: I know that some of you will be asked by others outside our Jewish community, "what the heck is a CANTOR???" Hopefully, this is a good start to help us explain to the larger Lubbock community.

May this Month of Elul, which leads up to the High Holy Days, be beautiful and fruitful for us all!


